



PROP 65

(STATE OF CALIFORNIA SAFE DRINKING WATER AND TOXIC ENFORCEMENT ACT)

The State of California's Proposition 65 (Prop 65), the Safe Drinking Water and Toxic Enforcement Act, became law in November 1986. Prop 65 includes labelling requirements for businesses to notify its consumers with "clear and reasonable" warnings of potentially hazardous chemicals present in its products. Warning labels are required on all products that contain one or more chemicals found on the State's list of over 900 compounds and must specify that the product contains chemicals "known to the State of California to cause cancer, birth defects, or other reproductive harm."

Warning requirements are dependent on the anticipated level(s) of exposure to the Prop 65 chemicals, which result from the foreseeable uses of a product. The warning requirements will only apply if the foreseeable and intended uses of a product containing these specified chemicals are likely to result in exposures that exceed the "significant risk" or "observable effect" levels. A determination of "significant risk" or "observable effect" can only be made with full knowledge of the end uses and applications of the products.

Based upon Anchor Harvey's current level of knowledge of its internal business operations and chemicals used, Anchor Harvey's products do not require a Prop 65 warning label.
